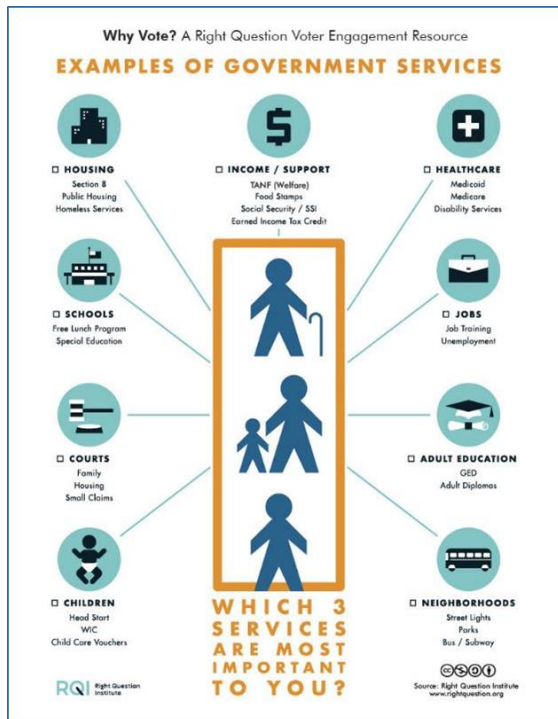

Over 90% of persons who are eligible to vote in Broward County are registered, but we have **hundreds of thousands of registered voters who do NOT vote!** Be a voter – just do it!

Elected officials can decide to:

- Provide or eliminate services
- Increase or reduce funding
- Make it easier or harder to sign up for those services

No matter the level of government (federal, state or local), elected officials make decisions about the services you receive.



Three ways to vote: Think of Election Day as your last chance to vote, not your first!

1) Vote-By-Mail (VBM)

- If you have not already requested your VBM ballot, you **MUST** request by 5 pm on Oct. 29 in order for it to be mailed to you. Request at www.browardvotes.gov or call 954-357-7055.
- Make sure your residential address and mailing address are correct! VBM ballots cannot be forwarded! Go to www.browardvotes.gov and then click on “My Voter Info”
- Sign the outside of the return mailing envelope. Without your signature, your vote will **NOT** count. Also, if multiple ballots come to your household, make sure you are signing **YOUR** envelope. Your name is on the return mailing envelope, in very tiny print.
- If using the postal service to return your VBM ballot, mail by October 29. The mailing envelope is pre-addressed and pre-paid. The ballot must be **RECEIVED** by the Supervisor of Elections office, **NOT** postmarked, by 7 pm on November 8.
- You can drop your completed VBM ballot (inside the signed return envelope) at **ANY** of the Early Voting locations during the days and times they are open.
- You **CANNOT** drop off your completed VBM ballot at your precinct on Election Day.

2) Early Voting

- Oct. 24 through Nov. 6: There are 24 Early Voting locations open from 7 am to 7 pm every day.
- Go to www.browardvotes.gov for list and map of all the locations.
- You need to bring a picture ID which has your signature.

3) Election Day – November 8

- You must vote at **YOUR** precinct. You need to bring a picture ID which has your signature.
- You **CANNOT** drop off your completed VBM ballot at your precinct. However, you can surrender it to the poll workers for a new ballot and vote in person.
